I wish I knew really, but I think I was born that way. To me it's usually women who are very, very close to the earth and it's kind of a cross between a druid and a shaman, I think, someone who is usually older, because you talk about mother maiden crone and I'm very much into my crone at the moment and I must admit, most of my paranormal spiritual experiences occurred within a year or so after the menopause and I had the menopause from hell, which is why in my book I've got an article called HRTS for women that go mad at the menopause. And it's actually quite funny. I had so many like I was lecturing to anything up to 2000 people at one time, and then I had the menopause and even if a student was sitting in there, they want to hide under the desk.

It took me about two years to come out of the brain fog and, curiously, although I wrote a funny article about it, because even my dog wouldn't sleep with me, I sent it off to the Lance. I sent it off to the Lancet. Men have given up years ago, but dogs usually like me, you know. But anyway, I sent this article off to the Lancet because in those days they used to take publications that were vaguely funny but were also medically relevant and to my surprise, they published it. And now, because there's a lot of interest on the effect of the menopause on women's general and particularly mental health, it's surprising the number of people who are still reading it after. And I think I published it while I was 50., so that was I don't know. I was born in 49. You can do the math, you know.

I could read it to you, but that would take up too long. Okay, so a hedge witch? Back to that for a second. A hedge witch is somebody who's doing healing through natural means, is what I'm hearing.

Yeah, I've taken my own interpretation of it because I think in Wales there's still an awful, there's a great interest in spiritual matters and there's lots of spiritual churches matters and there's lots of spiritual churches. I usually chair a meeting in a place called herryford community center, uh, every other fortnight, every other week rather, and I I was thinking about how come there's seems to be more in wales, with the land of the witches and the druids, you know, and then in England and I I think it may well go back to the burning times when, as you know, witches, particularly in Scotland and slightly less so in England, were routed out. One is funny. One is that the witch hunters couldn't speak Welsh, which is good, isn't it? I can't speak Welsh, but if it's just as well, probably I wasn't born a few hundred years ago, but also because the population was quite poor and the population in general respected these women. They appreciated they were the midwives. Both my grandmothers helped in birthing babies years and years ago in the poor Welsh valleys and also they were the healers and the herbalists and I think that's how we survived. In a way there's still a history of that, very much so in Wales.

I think that's how everybody survived in every culture. Yeah, it was the women, even the witch doctors you know that they had in indigenous cultures. It was the women that were integrating all of that. So you also are an academic physician. What does that mean?

Well, I would say R. I have been retired now for quite a long time, but I came from a very poor background and I felt that my mother always said said education is the salvation of the working classes. And I suppose because I was fat I thought I'd never get a wealthy husband. But I was a workaholic and I did a degree in King's College in London in biophysics, and my tutor was Morris Wilkins, who won the Nobel Prize, with Watson and Crick for discovering DNA. And so my first degree was very academic and I intended coming to America to study a disease called retinitis pigmentosa.

But having said that, what happened is that the Vietnam War escalated and the shop I was working for lost its grant. But at the same time I was cleaning the floor in one of our local hospitals to help pay for my training and I saw a lady who was sobbing her heart out in outpatients and I went up to her and said you know, can I help you? I just felt bad, even though I was just mopping the floor, it was just the cleaner, and she said her doctor had just told her

she would never have children because she had something called pelvic infection. And I thought, oh, I'm only a cleaner. If I was a doctor I could help her. So it planted a seed in my mind and it's quite interesting that decades later I became an expert in the prevention of pelvic infection. But that's by the by. But then, just before I did finals, I developed a wisdom tooth impaction and my parents paid for me to have my wisdom teeth removed and I was in agony because they'd fractured my jaw and I remember one of the nurses gave me pethidine and I was immediately lifted from agony into normality and I thought, oh gosh, I really want to be a doctor. That is so cool to be able to do that for someone. And so I ended up becoming a doctor.

But I had this very strong. I've always been nosy and I had this very strong desire to do research and I also have a wicked sense of humor. And I ended up specializing in sexually transmitted diseases, where a sense of humor is like a necessity. I could tell you loads of funny stories, but we'll digress aside. I told you I was bound. You'll have to edit that out.

But anyway, I then became very, very interested in infectious diseases of the vagina, particularly something which I called anaerobic vaginosis, which was eventually called bacterial vaginosis, and I produced two Lancet papers in that area and as a result, even as a registrar, I was like having my papers signed by overseas professors and lecturing in America and sometimes in Europe. And so I was kind of highly academic and I had my own academic unit it was only me in it, mind you in St Thomas's in London. But then, as often happens, I fell in love with my mother's Jack Russell and it was more love than I'd ever felt for anything, and so I couldn't bear being in London, so I took a consultant post. I had a consultant post in Swansea, which was somewhat of a backwater at the time and it was in a workhouse the old VD clinic was. But then I was still academic in my head and I ended up producing another Lancet paper on the prevention of pelvic infection in 93. And so I was very much a clinician, but also with this kind of scientific background.

That never really left me. So I'm not sure if that answers your question. I talk too much, I'm sorry.

Well, it does, because I was thinking, when you describe yourself as an academic physician, that you didn't have clinical experience. You were just doing the research primarily. But it sounds like you've done both.

Oh no, mine was mainly clinical, I just put the other as my hobby. I never went on holiday. You know I'm so boring. It's like my mother once said to me. She said she taught me how to work but not how to play. And it's absolutely true. I've had such a boring life in many ways because I've just worked, you know, took care of my patients, took care of research and took care of my mother for years. You know, we have duties, don't we? Well, and for those who aren't familiar with the Lancet, the Lancet is a British medical journal that's one of the top in the world. If not considered to be the top, it is actually the top yeah, even the New England by a lot of physicians around the world and medical researchers. And so for you to have one, let alone more than one article, published there, I feel like I should be fanning you with a palm leaf or something. Oh, no, palm branch, long time ago.

Long time ago. But what was cool is that, even when I was doing this is, let me see, the last Lancet paper was 1983. One in 82, one in 83, then another in 93. But the 83 one was a double-blind, placebo-controlled trial of a particular drug and it was very expensive to run because we were doing what they call semi-quantitative analysis of the bacterial flora of the vagina and it was absolutely imperative that all the patients came back for their follow-ups. Okay, and so the day before they were due to come in, I would hold their notes and pray and my follow-up rate was almost 100%. But what was more interesting is that the technician who was working with me called me one day to say that he couldn't come to the appointment we'd set with this particular lady.

And in those days there weren't mobile phones and I didn't have any contact details for her. So I actually got her case notes, held them and prayed for her to phone me and a few hours later she said oh, you've been kind to contact me. She phoned me. I was a little bit. Oh, that was cool, you know. But in fact, just to verify it, I actually asked her to speak to my boss the name was Nicol Finn just to tell him what had happened, because I was getting a bit of a reputation of being a bit psychically aware, shall we say, and it was nice to have some lady who was very I remember she was a very pleasant girl to confirm it. So I did actually use the power of prayer or intent, even when I was doing at the height of my academic career. I didn't regard it as odd, I just did it and I have no idea why.

Was there a catalyst that pushed you from being a practicing and academic physician into focusing more on the hedge witch side of the equation the spiritual, the energy, healing, all of that?

I think it was always in me to a degree, because I had a spirit child friend when I was seven or eight six, seven or eight, I suppose and then when I was 17, we lived in a tin shed, basically, and I was always keen to go to school. And I got up one morning and I was terrified. I said Mom, somebody at school is going to die, and I'm really scared. And she said, oh, don't be silly. So we didn't have a phone, didn't have radio or anything. And the next morning the same thing happened, but no one had died. On the third morning I woke up in a state of calm and I said, oh, ma'am, mr Sharpe, our deputy head teacher, has died. And she thought I was crazy, how could I know? And he was at peace, and when I went to school he had indeed died in his sleep. So I told my school friends obviously the previous day that I was worried somebody was going to die. So that was weird. So I kind of accepted it. But you see, my dad used to douse for water for where my grandfather built houses and he was very good at grafting apple trees and things like that For people who don't know what dousing is can you explain that please Well

with him. It's a way of tapping into energy fields, I would say. And my dad was absolutely amazing. He was quite a strong fellow, but he would get a Y-shaped piece of hazel, hold the two ends of the Y, as it were, and if he walked across an area where there was water, the stick would go right up and over and down, you know, over towards his chest, and the actual bark would come off the hazel. But you can do it with anything. You know a chudash had got one for you, but you could even put a bit of bread on the end of a string and you just say show me your yes, show me your no. But people can use it to um find lost pets, but it's. It was originally, as far as I understood, um used to find out where, where water runs, and I think with the flowing of water you do get an energy fields and some people tune into it is that with the pendulums?

Yeah, yeah sure, A jowl sink, yeah, and you could get the two cross wires as well. Yeah, I should have got my. I got loads of them here. They're great to play with actually.

I have a girlfriend that hers is amazing. She'll hang it. Her name's Janine and she'll hang it and that thing will just start going vroom, vroom, vroom.

Yeah, you're round and round and round, that's right.

Yeah, I got the Spinning like crazy, or go back and forth. That's it, yeah. Yeah, it's amazing. I guess I never equated the dowsing rods with the pendulum, but it makes sense that it's all the same thing. It's the same thing.

I remember I had a patient came to see me in Swansea years ago. I don't think I put this in my book, but it was quite interesting. I had always had a picture of my Jack Russell on the desk and we started talking about dogs and she told me that some years previously she'd taken her two dogs in an area of South Wales where there were a lot of previous coal mines and they both ran down a big rabbit hole to chase a rabbit, I suppose, and the one dog came back that a Jack Russell didn't. And she had friends in the mountain rescue team and had them looking for the dog. Blah, blah, blah.

And after two or three days she was desolate because the dog hadn't appeared, and so she contacted a lady who was a dowser who could look at a map and use a pendulum to find where the dog was, and she was so desperate she phoned this woman up and the woman you know, blah blah, blah, and apparently she said this lady wouldn't charge for looking for pets because she was this animal lover, and she told this patient where the dog was, and it was quite a long way away from where they'd been looking where the dog was lost. But she said yes, she managed to persuade the team to go back up and they got the dog and it was fine, apart from having sore paws from where it had tried to dig itself out. So I'm sure it does work.

What did your family say and what did your colleagues say when you started getting more into the energy medicine and the woo-woo? Did you get any blowback from that?

My colleagues. I suppose I can answer you in the best way, because King Charles asked me that question. What he actually said when I met him was Dr Blackwell don't your colleagues think you're rather mad? Because I told him about patients coming in with their late relatives, and one came in with a horse that had a message for her and I said well, I said sir. I said I've got a degree in biophysics, I've got degrees in medicine, I've got three Lancet papers, two of which permanently altered clinical practice.

I was chairman of the Trust Consultant Committee at the time and I was also a member of the Royal College of Physicians Integrated Health Committee and I had a higher award for clinical excellence. And I said so. I said, sir, when I tell my colleagues that a patient came in with the spirit, with a horse horse spirit they asked me what type of horse, and so and so, and he hooted with laughter, and so I think I couldn't have done it if I didn't have a strong academic background. I'm also incredibly practical. You know, I have to service my own car and I could

milk a cow, and, and so I had my feet very firmly in the ground and hopefully not insane. I don't think I was. Maybe now, I don't know.

Well, same with me. I'm a businesswoman who learned how to do woo-woo and same thing, but I learned how to do it. I didn't experience things as a child as you did. When you said you had a friend as a child, that was a spirit friend. Tell us a little bit about that.

I can still remember her. I must have been six, seven or eight and we lived out well no, I still live out in the countryside, but it was much more underdeveloped then. And my mother, if she wanted to find where I was, I would sit next to the beehives, very close, and talk to the bees, and I'd have large trees behind me. And then if I wanted company, I would go up the field to our cow shed where there was a little girl called Christine. She had short black hair and we would just play silly games in the cow shed and I would insist that my mother laid a place for her at the table and my parents kind of accepted it. You know, they never questioned it, and so Christine was your spirit friend.

Yeah, yeah, she didn't exist. Well, she does exist only in the spirit world, and so my mother would set a place for her table. But I'd never asked my mother to put food on the plate, I think basically because I was greedy. I wanted it myself. I don't know, but it's very strange. I wanted a plate foot for her, but they acknowledged it, and then, as I grew older I suppose you know Christina disappeared, or maybe I was less aware of her.

But I was just interested in growing food because I would come home from school, especially in the summer, and I would be home at about half

past four. We'd have some tea and then I'd be in the field until dark weeding the fodder beet to feed the cattle, and then I'd be doing my homework till two o'clock in the morning, and so it was an existential existence. It's a good life, really, because you didn't have to worry about you know Facebook friends saying you were awful, and I used to help my friends at school with their homework. You know you be my friend, I'll help you with your homework.

Right right, what surprised and or delighted you the most so far in your journey? If you had to look back on your life, are there one or two memorable events that stand out?

First was meeting the king, because I'm not particularly a royalist, but he let me hold his hand and tune into his energy field, and I found out a few things.

Oh yeah, it was cool. Yeah yeah, this is all on air so I've got to behave myself. But I did end up flirting with him horrendously because I was telling him what happened. I went to Kerala with the Prince's Foundation for Integrated Health to study Ayurvedic medicine and then we, the group of doctors, we met what was Prince Charles at the time at Sarin's house, in his obviously his home, and I kind of fell in love with him straight away. His energy, he's got the most beautiful voice. Honestly, as soon as I met he started talking to me. I thought your place or mine. I thought, no dear, we're in yours and you're married. You know Camilla's toast sort of thing.

But yeah, I was shaking so much that they give you tea and there were no chairs to sit down and I was shaking the cup of raffia oh dear, I didn't have anywhere to put it and I said I said I said because we were told to call him your Royal Highness or Sir, okay, and I was so nervous. He said don't worry, dr Blackwell, I have that effect on a lot of people. And I thought I really do love you now. And then I said I said I said no, I said it's just that the only men I call sir are those I am about to examine. And I'm afraid you, and I'm afraid you may cough and I might behave inappropriately ie grab his testicles and we both burst out laughing. But I was still shaking. So I said would you mind if I hold your hand? Because he actually in practice, what happens? If people have got very strong energy fields, it can interact with your own and I was going, you see, and so I let me hold his hand. He said sure, and he's got really big manly hands like a farmer. And I said oh, do you mind if I read your energy field? So he said go ahead.

So there was me and I could sense this kind of misty figure of Merlin energy standing behind him. So I told him that and I told him a few other things which are a bit irrelevant now. But anyway we were talking so much about dead spirits and telepathy etc. And then at the end he was about to leave and he came up to me and said oh, you never told me what Merlin energy is. Yes, there's a lady called is it? Babette Rothschild and written a book called Our Bodies. Remember? And yeah, two main examples. I'm just trying to think of sensible ones for you.

Many years ago I had a medical student sitting in with me called Becky Rebecca I've changed her name in the book, but anyway, they have to sit in one VD session as part of their training. And a lady came in who'd been raped, and Becky was sitting next to me. And during the course of the interview the lady was so upset she was not in a state for me to be able to examine her. And so I said well, I need to check you out to make sure there's no infection. And I said do you mind? I'm a spiritual healer. Do you mind if I use energy methods to calm you down? And so I just held her hand and kind of took her into a little meditation. I said do you know any part of your home where you feel safe? And she said yes, my back garden. So I just took her to the back garden, put her into a little bit of hypnotic state, managed to do all the tests and blah, blah, blah.

At the end of the clinic, Becky came into my office to say could I sign her card? You know she had to sign a card to say that she'd be with me. And she said I found it very odd. She said that she'd be with me and she said I found it very odd. She said that she felt calm when I was calming the patient down. The energy field had affected her as well, and so she said will you show me what energy healing feels like? I said, yeah, okay, this is, you know, my office and so is it. Hold your hand out. And I just did that over and above her hands, and I just said, oh, there's like a prickly sensation over one of the joints. And it turned out I noticed that one of her joints was a little bit distorted and she said it was a family thing and that her grandmother had warned her she would get arthritis. So I went in a little deeper and I'm trying to go back to it in my mind and I said oh, I said when you were a teenager you delivered. I said, I said you were a teenager and I can feel warm frog's bone. And I said, no, it's not warm frog's bone, it's the fetal membranes of a newborn lamb. And I said when you were a teenager you delivered a lamb and that changed your fate into your destiny. And she looked absolutely shocked and she said when she was about 14 she in fact sorry, I'm a bit like this now because spirit has just come into the room is I got pins and needles all around my body. But anyway, she said she stayed with a friend who was father, was a shepherd and a sheep had delivered a lamb in front of them, and her friend was squeamish and so Becky had lent down and removed the fetal membranes so that the lamb would could breathe. And I said, yes, you were kneeling on on wet grass. And she said, no, it was wet straw, so I had to get it slightly wrong. And then she said that by the end of the week she was delivered so many lambs she decided to be a midwife and then. And then foresaw this I'm going to be a doctor, so that episode and it was stored in her energy field, which I think is so cool.

So yeah, I don't know how much, but there was another time where I haven't written about it because it's still very traumatic, but I had surgery in 2010 for what they thought was adrenal cancer, but it wasn't. But my post-operative care was appalling. It's so distressing I can't even

talk about it, let alone write about it. But I had a large scar which was extremely painful, and what happened is that when I came out of the anesthetic, I was given a drug because my blood pressure had dropped, something called gelofusin, and my blood pressure fell to 56 over nothing, and it basically meant I was dead. And I wasn't really aware of anything. And I can remember, as I was going under, I could feel, as the drug was going in, I was dying. I knew I was dying and I remember it was quite interesting.

I was reframing things. I thought, oh, I haven't done a will. And I thought, oh well, my sister will have it. No, she doesn't like me, I don't really mind, you know she's blood. And then I thought, oh well, the good side thing is I won't have post-operative pain, so I wasn't afraid of dying. I thought I won't get post-operative pain, but anyway, I did survive and for at least six months, every night I relived my death.

I relived that death, but it gradually got a little better. I'd wake up with panic attacks. And then one night I was sleeping, but it was a lucid dream and I couldn't wake up and I relived the operation itself and I felt the surgeon's blade. I relived the operation itself and I felt the surgeon's blade, and when I did eventually wake up, my nitrous was ringing with sweat, my jaw was clenched and painful and my scar and it was a year later was just as painful as it was on the first post-operative day. And I couldn't believe it. But I worked out. It was exactly a year to the day of the operation and I think it's something called ripples in time and somehow I'd flashed back. So, yes, does the body remember? Yes, unfortunately, I don't want to bore you, but yeah.

No, no, it's not boring, it's fascinating because I always want to, especially when I have a private client. We will do an emotional healing and I perceive that the energy of the spirit in the body is encased in what I call the energy-filled membrane. It's like a container an energy block which is precipitated by an emotional event.

So I go into that terror hole and I'm given a scene and I'll be given a year and information. But what I've started doing in recent years is I just say, okay, the year was 1972.
